Adv. I	 Continue to develop mature sound. Continue working on the overtone series. Learn minor scales/triads (Melodic, Harmonic, Natural) in all twelve keys and be able to play them at least one octave (two when possible). Learn minor and dominant seventh chords Continue improving ear by playing melodies in twelve keys Be able to play all intervals from Major 2nd to Major 7th through the cycle of fourths and chromatically. Continue jazz/classical saxophone listening. Adv. II & III	 Develop more sophisticated tonal concepts and control: a vibrato that is a natural part of the tone, not an addition to it, natural use of dynamic flexibility, and awareness of perfect intonation Begin study of altissimo range Learn how to manipulate reeds Learn the modes of major, whole tone scales, diminished scales, pentatonic scales Learn augmented triads, diminished triads, half-diminished seventh chords Establish daily practice routine to refine skills By this time student may want to focus more attention on one genre or the other, classical or jazz Continue jazz/classical saxophone listening 	Etude/Method/Solo books from previous year can be used.
